New

1 Corinthians 6:8-20

- 1. Believers are a "new creation" but can still have old and dangerous appetites. (1 Cor 6:8-11)
 - a. Temptation is inevitable. (1 Cor 10:13)
 - -We are tempted to take what God has not given to us.
 - -We are tempted to steal from others.
 - b. Be careful about condemning others' temptations and ignoring your own.
 - -We rank sins according to our own standards.
 - -God designed us and knows what is best for us.
 - c. God wants us to come as we are, but not stay as we are.
 - -What we were is not what we are.
 - -We are not defined by our appetites.
- 2. Through the gospel, we can have a new life. (1 Cor 6:11-13)
 - a. Believers are not a slave to their appetites. (Rom 6:6)
 - -God always gives us an alternate option. (1 Cor 10:13)
 - -We have everything we need for overcoming sin.
 - b. Not all of our appetites need to be fed.
 - -Feeding your appetites often makes them stronger.
 - -God is not the one tempting you.
- 3. We were built to worship. When we worship anything but God, it opens us up to destruction. (1 Cor 6:13-20)
 - a. "God is most glorified in us when we are most satisfied in Him." John Piper
 - -Contentment is an uncommon blessing.
 - -We can take what belongs to God and give it to someone else.
 - b. Some worship sex.
 - -Sexual immorality comes at a uniquely high price.
 - -Satan offers a cheap substitute for God's best.

Questions for discussion and application.

- 1. Why is it so easy to notice others' sins and ignore our own? How can studying 1 Cor 6:8-10 help us to identify our own vulnerabilities?
- 2. How is temptation different from sin? What does it mean for a Christian to be "washed, sanctified, and justified?"
- 3. How can rationalized sin lead to dangerous addiction? How does God offer us victory over sin and addiction?
